Influenza vaccination is of critical importance this season because of the COVID-19 pandemic, vaccination will help reduce the impact on the health care system. Please stress the importance of influenza vaccination with your high risk patients and healthcare colleagues, as well as those who are in direct, regular contact with medically high risk individuals.



Primary care providers are encouraged to work with their local Division of Family Practice to promote access to influenza immunization and coordinate with local Public Health Units to order vaccines for their practices. We recognize that primary care providers currently have varied levels of capacity to provide influenza vaccine to their patients, and support any of the options outlined in the graphic below. Public Health will continue to supply influenza vaccine to primary care providers who order flu vaccine. This year pharmacists will receive vaccine directly through BCCDC and the BC Pharmacy Association.

Options for Influenza Vaccine Administration for Primary Care Providers



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The Provincial Influenza campaign starts in mid-October. Community Vaccine Providers can start placing orders the week of October 4^{th} , with expected distribution week of October 12^{th} .

Eligibility: This is the current eligibility as of 20 Sept 2021. This may change. Please see <u>BCCDC</u> website for most current eligibility criteria.

Currently, there are no changes to eligibility criteria for the 2021-2022 season. Influenza vaccine is recommended for everybody, and provided free to individuals at high risk of influenza complications as well as those in contact with people at high risk including:

- Children 6-59 months of age
- People 65 years of age and older
- Pregnant women
- People 5-64 years of age with underlying chronic health conditions
- Health care workers
- Visitors to health care facilities
- Essential community service providers

Health Unit Ordering and Distribution Plan:

Our goal is to distribute the influenza vaccine in an equitable, timely and reasonable manner to all providers. Public Health receives regular shipments of influenza vaccine from BCCDC from October through December. These shipments arrive with an initial shipment of approximately 50% of the overall allotment for all providers followed by smaller allotments in subsequent weeks. Community vaccine providers can expect their flu vaccine to be allocated in the same way.

For your **first order**, request only quantities of vaccine you anticipate needing for the first two weeks. **Subsequent orders** can be placed as needed. Doses on hand **must** be recorded on the order form. If you are holding a large flu immunization clinic, include the details on the Influenza Vaccine Order Form including the clinic date and expected doses needed. **Public Health is not responsible to follow-up with providers who place incomplete orders. Forms with incomplete information including doses on hand will result in orders not being filled.**

Influenza vaccine will be distributed based on available supply. If an ordered vaccine is no longer available, another equivalent product will be supplied. If no influenza vaccine or acceptable substitute is available, submit another order for additional vaccine or for a different available product. **Orders will NOT be backfilled**.
